Bus Duty and Drop Off Zone

The yellow marked area at the front of the school is a 2 minute drop off or pick up zone. The buses that come and pick students up need to be able to access the front area of the school.

When the bell goes at 3pm, students who are being collected by their parents/carers need to sit on the seats outside the office area as soon as possible where they will be supervised by a teacher. Please be mindful that if your child is not out the front waiting, can you please do the loop and come back around to allow the traffic to keep moving.

The front car park is owned by the council and the police are constantly conducting spot checks and will be booking parents who are illegally parked in and around schools.

An alternative to the front pick up area along Flaxton Drive is at the back of the school along Obi Obi Road.

Every day counts!

Being at school every day counts. If your child is absent one day per week, this quickly adds up to two months of missed school in a year. School absenteeism and truancy can impact significantly on students' learning and wellbeing. Research shows that in Queensland, higher student attendance is associated, on average, with higher student achievement. Additionally, attending school every day helps children to build social and emotional skills such as communication, teamwork and resilience.

Under the law, you must make sure your child is enrolled and attends school on all school days unless there is a reasonable excuse. Schools must monitor the attendance of students and follow up with parents and caregivers any unexplained absences.

If your child is away from school can you please either:

If you are dropping off or collecting your child throughout the day and the office is unattended, can you please complete the student register which is located on the bench in the office?

Curriculum Corner

<u>Curriculum Corner</u>

Welcome back to all of our school families. On the pupil free days before school started, our school staff completed a great deal of professional learning. For our teachers and teacher aides, the focus was deepening knowledge about how we learn to read and spell. This involved investigating the latest research from a variety of sources, including neuroscientists, education specialists and speech therapists. We are working together to use what we have learned to refine what we are doing in our classrooms. Just like kids, we are always learning!

Spelling is our school-wide focus this year. Our goal is to further develop a consistent, effective whole-school approach to spelling, which will support all students to become confident spellers. We will be sharing lots of information with parents and carers about spelling throughout the year.

This week, we are sharing information about the alphabetic principle and how we are helping kids to 'crack the code' of the English alphabet.

Cracking the code of the English alphabet



The English alphabet has a code. We can learn to 'crack the code' to help us read, write and spell.

Sounds are spelled using letters. Learning which letters represent each sound will help us to crack the code!

What is the Alphabetic Principle?

An important thing to understand is the Alphabetic Principle. The alphabet was invented (it was a genius moment in history!) so that sounds of speech were represented by symbols. This was an amazing invention because it meant that any language and any word could be written down with relatively few symbols. You simply had to make sure there were enough symbols to spells the sounds in your language.

So, when we teach reading and spelling we are teaching kids to decode the sound/symbols code that was invented by the Phoenicians, taken on by the Greeks and perfected by the Romans thousands of years ago. This is the Alphabetic Principle. The actual correspondences between the sounds and letters in English is called the 'Alphabetic Code'. English is a 'layered' language that adopted words from other languages (Anglo Saxon, Norse, French, Latin, Greek and more). This has created a complex Alphabetic Code compared to transparent languages such as Spanish or Italian that are so much easier to learn to read and spell.

The image below demonstrates the Alphabetic Principle: how sounds are spelled by letters. Each dot is a one-letter spelling of a sound in a word and a dash has a spelling of more than one letter. Where you have a link symbol - this is a split digraph (a split spelling). **Source – 'Phonic Books'**


A<u>ll</u> w<u>ords</u> can be decoded. When we read w<u>ords</u> we decode them. Even 'sight' w<u>ords</u>: was, <u>said</u>, <u>see</u>, <u>say</u>, my, came.

Curriculum Corner (continued)

How the brain learns to read

We also investigated the work of cognitive neuroscientist Stanislas Dehaene, whose research centres on how the brain learns to read. His work brings neuroscience from the laboratory to the classroom, to help us understand exactly how our brains work when we are learning the very complex skill of reading. Some key take-aways are included below. If you are interested, his video 'How the brain learns to read' can be found on YouTube.

- Conclusion: Neurosciences can help education
- Reading, in all cultures relies on the same brain mechanisms
- Reading requires specializing the visual systems of our brains for the shapes of letters, and connecting them to speech sounds
- Teaching letter-sound correspondences is essential
- It is also the fastest way to acquire reading and comprehension
- Once we learn letter-sound connections, selfteaching can occur. That means children can decipher words, recognise when they hear them and access their meaning.
